ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS

Student Council representatives are to be held accountable for both their attendance of Student Council activities and scholastic activities. Identified below are the NHS Student Council Code of Conduct requirements for each of these categories.

Student Council Activities

Requirements of Student Council representatives include but are not limited to:

- All representatives are required to attend all events, including but not limited to meetings, event set-up and tear-down, and other activities deemed mandatory as indicated by the Advisor(s).
- All absences shall only be excused if the representative submits an Absence Verification Form, which is corroborated by the email of a parent, guardian, coach or other individual leading the activity for which the event was missed.
- All representatives are also required to personally notify the Advisor(s) of their absence.
- Absences shall only be excused if:
 - the representative is not present at school that day and the absence is considered excused by attendance and guidelines.
 - the representative has and provides written/electronic communication from a staff member requesting the representative remain in class.
 - the representative is legally bound or ordered to be elsewhere.
 - o other extreme circumstances occur that are approved at the discretion of the Advisor(s) and the Executive Board.
 - work shall only be allowed as an excuse for either event set-up or tear-down if a representative has and provides a written/electronic notice of the absence prior to the event.
 - o if a member arrives at an early bird or regular school day meeting more than 10 or 5 minutes, respectively, after it has been called to order (without the aforementioned requirements), the representative shall be considered "unexcused" for that meeting.

Scholastic Activities

As leaders in their classes, Student Council representatives are expected to attend classes. Absences can be categorized as excused or unexcused. It is expected that Student Council representatives shall:

- have no unexcused absences.
- ensure any absences are excused Upon notification from the Advisor(s) and/or Executive Board.

ACADEMIC REQUIREMENTS

While Student Council recognizes that academic performance is one of several tiers that contribute to success, the Council deems it particularly significant, especially considering the leadership role of representatives. As leaders in their school and community, it is expected that Student Council representatives perform at high levels and model appropriate academic behavior to their peers.

Identified below are the Student Council Code of Conduct requirements for academic performance.

Application Requirements

At the time of application for the following year's term, prospective Student Council representatives must have:

• a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.5.

Students earning less than a GPA of 2.5 at the time of application shall be deemed ineligible for Student Council membership and shall not be added to the ballot for the following year's term, unless the deficient GPA is rectified one week prior to election dates.

Term Requirements

In addition to time of application requirements, current Student Council representatives must have:

- a minimum grade of "C-" in all classes at designated eligibility verification times
- Student Council representatives earning less than a "C-" shall be deemed ineligible to be a representative of Student Council.

STUDENT COUNCIL OFFICER JOB DESCRIPTIONS

President

- Attend all Student Council Meetings
- Prepare agenda for all Student Council meetings
- Preside over Student Council meetings
- Understand the basic rules of parliamentary procedure
- Work with advisors on Student Council meetings
- Assign tasks to committees and individuals
- Represent Student Council in the community
- Make sure Student Council work gets done on time
- Report regularly to Advisor about Student Council news, weekly newsletter and website updates
- Perform other duties or tasks as needed
- Conduct self with academic integrity and exemplary conduct

A student council president is like the captain of a ship. He or she needs to know how to handle many types of situations, be mature, organized, have sound judgment, and possess an ability to work with many different kinds of people. A captain who does not possess these abilities may face a mutiny by the crew, or even a shipwreck. A student council president who lacks the leadership ability to direct council affairs may face an unmanageable student body or council.

Keeping the delicate balance between leading the student council and encouraging other officers, members, and interested students to take on leadership responsibilities is a challenge. In addition, the practical side of being president requires energy, careful management of time, and a good relationship with the student body.

Vice President

- Assume the president's duties, if necessary.
- Attend all Student Council Meetings
- Communicate regularly with the Student Council President
- Be ready to take over for the president if he/she cannot attend a meeting
- Keep a record of the work being done by each committee
- Attend committee meetings
- Keep the president informed about the progress being made by committees
- Perform other duties or tasks as needed
- Conduct self with academic integrity and exemplary conduct
- Assist the president in preparing meeting agendas.

The role of the vice president must be defined with the president. A good president is eager to help develop the vice presidential position into a creative and productive one, but sometimes the president must be reminded to do that. The vice president can become the right hand assisting the president.

<u>Secretary</u>

- Attend all Student Council Meetings
- Keep accurate records of meeting and student attendance
- Create Newsletter to be published and posted in each classroom and staff offices
- Send cards, notes and letters as needed or requested by advisors
- Create a schedule for morning announcement announcers
- Perform other duties or tasks as needed
- Conduct self with academic integrity and exemplary conduct
- Prepare and distribute the agenda for meetings
- Take minutes of the proceedings of all student council meetings
- Receive all main motions and amendments proposed during a meeting to be included in the minutes
- Prepare and distribute minutes in a timely manner.
- Maintain file of original agendas and minutes
- Maintain files of student council
- Maintain contact information of people with which the student council regularly works.
- Produce a student council directory

The duties of the secretary are much more comprehensive than simply taking minutes. The secretary will need to attend every meeting to get all student council information, or arrange another member of the executive committee or an approved substitute.

Treasurer

- Attend all Student Council meetings
- Present proposed budget of activities to student council
- Oversee council expenses and revenues
- Give monetary advice to the student council
- Keep accurate record on income and expenses
- Report at each meeting on money matters
- Coordinate fundraising projects
- Understand the policies the school has in regard to use of student finances and explain them when necessary
- Perform other duties or tasks as needed
- Conduct self with academic integrity and exemplary conduct

The treasurer keeps accurate records of all financial transactions and periodically reports a summary of the monetary transactions to the executive committee and at meetings. The treasurer predicts how money will be used in the future and makes concrete suggestions for saving money and increasing efficiency. To do the job correctly, a treasurer must keep track of all expenditures and add the appropriate transactions to the books. The treasurer should be the person concerned with the regulating flow of money.

Council Historian

- Attend all Student Council Meetings
- Gather interesting facts regarding our school, community and its members
- Create displays or bulletin with information gathered and update as needed
- Record the activities of the year through video, photos, written reports, and other materials
- Perform other duties or tasks as needed
- Conduct self with academic integrity and exemplary conduct

The historian is charged with developing a pictorial and written record of the highlights of the year. This job can't be done in a few nights. It is a year long effort. This position can be incorporated into an officer's duties or it can be help by a person whose sole responsibility is this assignment.

OTHER POSSIBLE SERVICE PROJECT IDEAS
